

He is currently collaborating on a graphic novel dramatizing the resistance to wartime incarceration, and blogs at Resisters.com.

## ABOUT JOHN OKADA: THE LIFE AND REDISCOVERED WORK OF THE AUTHOR OF NO-NO BOY

John Okada's novel *No-No Boy* centers on a Japanese American who refuses to fight for the country that incarcerated him and his people in World War II and, upon release from federal prison after the war, is cast out by his divided community. In 1957, the novel faced a similar rejection until it was rediscovered and reissued in 1976 to become a celebrated classic of American literature. This new compelling collection on Okada offers the first full-length examination of his development as an artist, placing a meticulously researched biography alongside his unknown writing and new critical essays. *John Okada* is an essential companion to *No-No Boy*.
